Daylily Growers of Dallas hosted our 2024 Region 6 Meeting. Friday night's guest speaker was Pam Smith, associated with the Jeff Fuller Rose Garden in Farmers Branch, TX. Her presentation was about adding structures in a garden, with examples from the botanical garden.

Saturday's tour gardens included Hooker and Bonnie Nichols' *Hillcrest Iris & Daylily Gardens* and the *Dog Days & Daylilies* garden of Pat Weller and Doug Dutton, where we got to see hundreds of daylilies in bloom. We also went to *Blue Moon Garden Center*, where we had lunch and a chance to browse all things garden. The former garden center owner gave an excellent presentation about lots of annuals and perennials that do well in that area, with examples of each in pots, so we could see exactly what they looked like. # Region 6 Meeting and Garden Tours, Austin, Texas May 26, 2023 Minutes

The 2023 Region 6 Meeting was called to order by Region 6 President Bonnie J. Nichols at 8:03 p.m. Ms. Nichols welcomed everyone to the Austin meeting and thanked the Austin Daylily Society for hosting the Meeting.

Ms. Nichols asked for a roll call for each of the clubs attending the region meeting and thanked them for their attendance. In attendance were the Johnson County Iris and Daylily Society, the Brazosport Daylily Society, the Austin Daylily Society, the Lone Star Daylily Society, and the Oklahoma Daylily Society. Special thanks were given to the Oklahoma Daylily Society.

The Treasurer's Report was presented by Mike Peppers, Treasurer. Mike welcomed everyone to the Region Meeting and to attending the dinner on Saturday evening at his home. He explained that the only money going out of the treasury was for the Regional newsletter. The funds coming in were from the auction at the meetings and donations from clubs. The auction today brought in \$2,345. \$5,000 was donated from the East Texas Daylily Society when they disbanded in 2022, and \$300 was donated by the Albuquerque Daylily Society. The balance in the Region 6 bank account was 17,548.28. The report will be filed for audit.

Beverly Winkelman, Secretary, presented the minutes of the November 22, 2022 meeting in Dallas. Copies of the minutes had been placed on each of the tables. Ms. Winkelman asked if there were any corrections to the minutes. A motion was made by Eddie Raye Andrews to approve the minutes, Loris Garrett seconded. The motion was approved.

Ms. Nichols announced that the President of the Lufkin Daylily Society, which had been in existence for 60 years, had decided to disband at the end of 2023.

President Bonnie Nichols announced that after 2 years as President, she would be resigning. She thanked everyone for giving her the opportunity to serve as the Region 6 President.

William Walker, Director of Region 6, stated that the National Convention Committee was looking for a location to hold the National Convention after 2025. At present, the 2024 convention will be in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and the 2025 will be in Seattle, Washington.

Publicity Report was presented by Tim Closs and Brent Mauthe. There is information in the summer newsletter about how to keep it and how to get more out of it.

Awards and Honors report was presented by Jeff

Breitenstein. He said that the Edna Lankhart and Annie T. Giles Awards would not be presented due to the drought and no scapes present.

Membership Chair Dan Cathey reported that from 2013 to 2023 there had been 70 new members added to the Region 6 membership. 1983-1993, the membership had increased by 11. Region 6 currently has 370 members. Forty-eight of those members are Life Members. He noted that some of the long-time members were Mary and Eddie Gage, joining in 1971, Patricia Kyser and daughter Judith in 1981, and Beth Zimmerman in 1988.

Mrs. Peggy Cathey, Newsletter Editor, announced the following deadline dates for the upcoming newsletters: June 30, show reports, open garden information and any other articles that would be of interest to the Region 6 readers. October 30<sup>th</sup> is the due date for the hybridizers.

Amy Howard's Garden Judges' report was presented in her absence. There are currently 17 active Garden Judges in Region 6. There are 8 that will need to be renewed this year.

Ray Houston does an outstanding job as our Region 6 Archivist and Webmaster.

Patricia Kyser reported on Exhibition Judges. Currently, there are 22 Senior Judges, 2 Junior Judges, 2 Instructors—Bonnie Nichols and Velia Sanchez-Ruiz—and 4 inactive judges. There will be a Clinic Refresher at the Region 6 Meeting on Saturday at 2.

There was no Horticulture Liaison Report from Mark Carpenter or Scientific Liaison Report from Don Heiskell.

Bonnie thanked the Oklahoma City Daylily Society for the news report and video about the Oklahoma City National in 2024.

The Nominating Committee, headed by Carolyn Taylor, announced that Bonnie Nichols had withdrawn her name from the election of President. Nancy Freshour presented David Freshour as the nominated President for 2024-2026. A motion was made by Loris Garrett to accept David as the President going forward in 2024. Eddie Raye Andrews seconded the motion. The motion carried. David's name will be presented at the Fall Board Meeting of AHS for final Board approval.

Bonnie welcomed Bill Walker as the Region 6 Director. Tim Closs stated the Region 6 Meeting will be in Dallas in 2024.

Jeff Breitenstein shared the plans for Saturday. He thanked Bonnie for her 2 years of service as President.

# Bad Weather Daylily Survey By Brant Mauthe, Region 6 Publicity Co-Chair



After Growing Daylilies for 20 years and seeing similar results every

Spring and Summer, the last three years have not been like anything I have seen. First, Rust, Leaf Streak, and Crown Rot have been at levels I could not have imagined. I dug up and threw away hundreds of seedlings and several named varieties because they were sickly and became disease spreaders. The arctic 0°F Winter blasts made scapes so short on some daylilies that I had to search for blooms,

or none appeared at all (H. 'Louie the Lip', H. 'Frank Gladney', H. 'I'm So Excited', which were all "shovel pruned" out of the garden). A hundred or so (around 15%) of my seedlings and some named varieties also succumbed to Crown Rot or just plain solar-oven cooking in our months of 100°F+ heat. Previous solid growers recommended highly varieties that fell into this category were H. 'Going Big Time', H. 'Buttered Popcorn', H. 'Primal Scream', H. 'Moana Loa', and H.

'Black Eyed Stella'. Almost all of my velvety reds and purples also fell into this category. However, even with all these struggles, I have seriously adopted the idea of recruiting more members into our local club since addi-

tional members tend to multiply the fun. In the past, I have shared some of my most vigorous growers and bloomers and invited the folks to join our club. Now, I am very selective about which varieties I will share so that they give the impression. possible Thankfully, a few daylilies have exceeded all expectations for me and the others I have shared them with. My best results with this have been with H. 'Alabama Jubilee'

and *H*. **'Unending Melody'**. They are tried and true, beautiful, eye-catching daylilies that are healthy rebloomers and always make a strong case for needing more daylilies in your garden!

This brought me to my question of how everyone else's daylilies have been doing with this new age of weather extremes. I decided to create a daylily survey for Region 6 to see what growing habits have changed and isolate it by each part of our region. The results have been gratifying but concerning at the same time. I have loved H. 'Rosie Meyer' in the past and have even shared it with However, it has been very weak and hasn't bloomed properly for two years now. I noticed in the survey I was not the only one in Dallas/Ft. Worth with problems with this variety. The cold has been too much for it here. Someone in Houston listed it in the "Better than Expected" category, which tells me it needs some solid winter weather, but Dallas, being farther north, has exceeded its cold limit lately. Your experiences and observations are invaluable to our Region, and I encourage you to continue sharing them.

The results are included in this article. It is worth noting that a few varieties disappeared with our first terrible hot weather in our garden three years ago but reappeared 1.5'-2' from their original spot in the garden this Spring and even bloomed. It was exciting to see *H*.

(Pierce-G, 2016) reappeared this year mixed in with another daylily. It grew over to the shadier spot under a strong, healthy seedling

'Crimson Bullseye' and H.
'Golden Sweet' bloom again although they were now mixed in with other plants. They still seem to be sensitive to our heat, which is starting now, but I am keeping other plants against them to help shade their crowns. My favorite companion plant for this is Vinca. The benefits of companion planting with Vinca are numerous, and it has proven to be a valuable addition to my garden. It

doesn't compete too badly if I regularly break off sections that threaten to entirely cover the daylilies but keep the base of the plants happy and cool when they surround them. Both plants also have similar demands for water and the Vinca blooms profusely right Survey cont. pg. 8

when the daylilies stop blooming. I now allow my Vinca to go to seed in the fall and it has come back the last two years. I still have to add additional plants as well since the volunteers don't come back everywhere. I really like the

results though. Very few dead daylilies are in the heat now, and the colorful companion blooms look like fireworks are going off in the heat!





Last year, I taught my great-grandson, Emmitt, how to hybridize. One of his crosses was *H*. 'How Are Ya' to *H*. 'Screen Pattern'. One of the seedlings from his cross bloomed on June 29th in 100° temperatures. He was so excited when his Mom showed him the picture, he wanted

her to drive 2 hours to come see it!





# Want to include more Youth Activity in your club? Here are a few ways to make it happen:

- 1.Assign a mentor to your youth members. Mom or dad may be involved in daylilies, but asking another club person to be a mentor would reinforce the daylily connection.
- 2.Clubs could invite a youth group (4-H, Scout etc.) to participate in a club function. One club invited a Brownies Troop to help at the annual plant sale. It was a positive experience for both. The members loved the young children. In turn the children had a good time. They learned about daylilies and each received a cultivar. The leftover plants from the sale were given to the troop to plant at their meeting place. The girls also earned a plant badge for their effort.
- 3.A club could pay the AHS membership dues for a youth interested in daylilies. The cost is only \$12.
- 4. Clubs could sponsor a youth to a Regional Meeting or to the AHS National Convention by covering the youth registration fee.
- 5.In order to encourage youth members to attend Regional Meetings and AHS Conventions, sponsoring clubs could offer reduced fees.
- 6.At Regional Meetings and AHS National Conventions, have all the youth members ride a bus together. Encourage youth members to serve as bus captains. At the banquet have a table(s) reserved just for them and their parents if space permits.
- 7.If a club can, subsidize or offer free of charge, trips, meals etc. to the youth members when they attend the club's functions.
- 8.Depending on the number of youths attending your meeting, special activities just for them can be initiated. The activity would depend on the age of the youths.
- 9. During plant sales and auctions, the youths make excellent spotters and runners.
  - 10.Ask a youth to write for your newsletter. A youth Summer 2024

- member could be assigned a garden for the Regional Meeting report, or he could write about a local garden visit. See that a youth in your region is made Junior Editor of the regional newsletter.
- 11.Include articles and pictures about the youth members in your local club newsletter and the regional newsletter.
- 12. Have an auction only for the youths. Give them daylily dollars. Solicit good plants (plants of value) beforehand from your club members.
- 13. Encourage the youths to take Garden Judge Workshops and Exhibition Judge Clinics and cover the fees.
- 14. Encourage youth members to participate in an AHS show. Show them how to groom their daylilies.
- 15. Visit the youth members' gardens. They, too, are proud to grow daylilies and share their gardens.
- 16.Look around your community. If your club can afford it, establish a scholarship(s) for youths involved in horticulture.
- 17. Buy an AHS membership for a school offering a horticulture program.
- 18.Contact and work with your region Youth Liaison in devising projects for the youths at regional meetings.
- 19.Clubs and individuals can make contributions to the AHS Youth General Fund. This fund is used to give scholarships to AHS Youth members. Instructions for applying for the AHS Bertie Ferris Youth Scholarship are on the AHS Web Page under Youth Page, in the Winter issue of The Daylily Journal, and in the Fall/Winter issue of Youth News, the AHS publication for youth members.
- 20. If youth members visit your garden, give them a daylily to take home.
- 21. Contribute to the Christine Erin Stamile Youth Fund. It provides one AHS Life Membership to a youth. See guidelines on how to apply in the Judging Daylily Handbook, Section A: Chapter A1-Personal Awards (A1-3), the Winter issue of The Daylily Journal, and in the Fall/Winter issue of Youth News.
- 22. Make up special goody bags for youth members who attend regional meetings. Include a disposable camera, candies, a pen and pad, a key chain, visor, etc.
- 23. Share your daylily journals, your catalogues, your regional newsletter, and other pertinent material with a youth.
- 24.Help a youth "build" a daylily bed, hybridize, gather seeds, grow seedlings, etc.
  - 25. Take the youth with you on visits to daylily gardens.
- 26.Be creative. Science projects, for example, are a great way to introduce youth to daylilies.
- 27.Remember to capture all those wonderful images of youth participation.

# Tips for creating a theme garden with the children in your life:

- Select a location that is easy for the child to access.

There's a sharp curve to the left on Huckleberry Drive in Lake Jackson. Nestled in this curve is a quaint display garden known as The Benvenuti Garden. Benvenuti is how Italian-speaking people say welcome. This peaceful garden is no larger than a city lot. Still, the two people who nurture this garden have devoted their lives to growing the massive array of daylily varieties that reside there. It has been almost fifteen years since I first happened upon this jewel. My family and I had just moved into a house a few blocks away, and I accidentally turned two streets before my own. There, to my surprise, stood this glittering display of daylilies. After that, I made a point to drive by and watch for new blooms throughout the seasons. These small trips would become a highlight of my week. Little did I know the true blessings were yet to come ten years later during the difficult days of COVID-19.

My husband was lucky enough to work from home, my children were attending school online, and we were all trying to maintain our sanity in quarantine when I remembered how much joy that garden on Huckleberry Drive brought me. To keep our sanity, we began taking daily walks to stand on the sidewalk in front of the Benvenuti Garden and admire its beauty again. This habit continued throughout changes in COVID restrictions, and on each trip, the children enjoyed seeing the dragonflies and butterflies flit from one blossom to another. The sweet perfume of the daylilies wafted in the air, carrying away our cares.

Fate stepped in on one of these trips and altered our lives for the better. The owners of Benvenuti emerged

However, Sandy and Loris were there to lift me and my family up with grace and love. They believed in me, did not let me quit, and fearlessly stood by us through the

We had opened registration up for 50 attendees and almost reached it! We had 49 participants registered, although three participants had personal and/or medical conflicts before the event. We hope those individuals are doing well and hope to see them at the next meeting. For those wanting information on the plant given at registration, it is a 2024 registration from Dan Hanson, and the name is *H.* 'Dallas Big City Lights'. It is now listed in the ADS Daylily Database Search:

Velia Sanchez-Ruiz also taught a refresher clinic on the Exhibition Judges Clinic III. In addition, the Region 6 Officers held their annual board meeting before the auction and evening activities. Bill Walker recently had to step down as the Regional Director due to health issues. We will miss you, Bill, and hope to see you at various meetings and shows! Mike Peppers stepped up and is now acting as Regional Director, Secretary, and Treasurer! Since our Youth Liaison position is open, Mike, do you want to do that too?! Just kidding! We appreciate your service on the Region Board. Thanks to all of our Regional Board Officers/Members! Because you are willing to serve, we can keep up our activities and programs.

After the auction, we heard from Pam Smith. She was the Park Landscape Manager for the City of Farmer's Branch, Texas, where she served the residents for 25 years! She did a fantastic job showing us different landscaping ideas that she had the privilege of making happen during her tenure as Park Landscape Manager. She also showed us pictures of other gardens and told us where some of her inspiration came from.

Unlike the cobbler whose children had no shoes, Pam has around 100 roses incorporated into her own home garden. She was blessed to make a living doing and sharing what is her passion. 

# How to Plan a Region 6 Meeting and Garden Tour

### From a Newbie

I am told that I can't really be called a "newbie" anymore. However, this process was new to me, so I will keep that title! If you have ever planned a major group event, you know that it must be the work of a committee. That committee can be as small as two and as large as you want. I hesitate to put a number on that! Regardless of how many workhorses you have to help, someone must be in charge. Daylily clubs are not mandatory clubs that require you to do anything. Therein lies a challenge. It means finding the support or "workhorses" needed to accomplish the event is harder. You will likely need to make assignments, and I hope everyone is willing to help support you.



Now, let's get down to business! What questions do you need to answer first? (Not in any particular order.)

- 1. Are there any gardens within your group that you could visit during the meeting time?
- 2. Is there a hotel close enough to allow tours? If you aren't doing any tours, what other nearby sites and events could attendees visit?
- 3. Travel. How close are you to an airport? Are you more accessible by car? How are you getting to the tours?
- 4. Auction! This is not a question! We have an auction to raise money for the publication of our Regional newsletter. All auction funds go to the Region.
- 5. Registration. Also, it's not a question; it's a must!
- 6. Will you have a raffle and silent auction area? These funds go to the club hosting the event.
- 7. Are you going to request club baskets? These funds also go to the Region.
- 8. What kind of food will you provide? How many meals? Will you provide snacks during registration and/or garden tours?
- 9. Is there a time that you can hold training classes?
- 10. What will the schedule look like?

I am sure I am missing some steps, but let's break this down!

#### Gardens

Are there any gardens in your club boundaries that will be in bloom at the time of the meeting?

Yes. That's great! How many gardens can you tour? It doesn't have to be an official display garden. It can be someone's yard that shows a variety of plants and landscaping options. We are a daylily group, but I think we all enjoy many plants and



flowers. Make sure the owners are receptive to a visit from all attendees. Schedule a time that would allow you to have the best bloom show. After all, how many of us want to tour a garden when nothing is blooming? How long does it take to get from one location to another if you have multiple options?

Is there a garden that can host the Award Beds? These beds need an area for seedlings from the host group and an area for seedlings from the rest of the Region. The Regional Awards and Honors Chair (Jeff Breitenstein) handles the particulars of the judging of these beds for the "Annie T. Giles Award" (host group) and the "Edna Lankart Award" (non-host group). I typed out the program this year and had to ask for clarification on these awards. I did not know seedlings had to be submitted up to a year in advance! It is also important to remember that whatever is submitted should not be in early or late bloom because you want it to bloom during the garden tour. It is hard to judge a seedling when it is not in bloom!

 $\underline{\text{No.}}$  Maybe you could host a fall meeting where we do not tour gardens.

#### **Hotel Accommodations**



If you have a garden or gardens to tour, is a hotel available within driving distance of the garden(s)? Remember that you will need a meeting place large enough to hold the allotted number of attendees you are expecting. You will also need space to keep all the auc-

tion plants, raffle, and silent auction items. Last year, the auction plants and eating/meeting area were in one room, while the raffle/silent auction items were in a separate room. This year, we held everything in the same room.

You will also need a place to set up for registration away from any training classes being taught. Is there a place where the Region 6 officers can meet for a meeting before the events start? You don't need large areas for these trainings and meetings. However, they do need to be somewhere where things can be discussed and not be easily interrupted.

Okay, you've been able to accommodate the meeting spaces needed. Will the hotel allow you to set up several rooms at a special rate for the event? This rate is generally given to a set number of rooms for a given period of time. This year, we found that the hotel wouldn't honor the rate if individuals booked their rooms within a month of the meeting.

Does the hotel allow you to bring in your own catering? Some hotels will only allow you to use their specified suppliers/caterers. This limits your meal options and is often at a premium price. Are there meal options away from the hotel that would work better? We will explore this more in the food section.

#### **Travel**

This is a topic that covers a couple of areas! First, we

have to travel to the event. Are you near an airport? We don't generally provide transportation to the event for those flying in. They can rent a car or schedule an Uber.

However, make sure there are options that they can choose. Not all areas have alternative transportation options available. For car travel, are you in an area that comes up on Google Maps? Some remote areas don't track very well. We don't want to

track very well. We don't want to have participants lost!

The second type of travel to consider is travel to the garden(s). Renting a bus is expensive! There are pros and cons to the bus issue. Renting a bus allows everyone to travel





together and renew friendships with other participants. This can also be done on a smaller scale in individual vehicles. This year, we kept people on the bus occupied by playing Daylily Jeopardy during the bus ride. Renting a bus alleviates any insurance concerns should an accident happen. Most individual poli-

cies cover other occupants in the vehicle, but the expense falls on the vehicle's owner. However, there are some people who have issues riding on buses. Be it car sickness or the noise level, these are real concerns. You will also need a car to follow the bus if someone gets sick or hurt and needs medical attention. Or, maybe just run to the store because the bus ran out of hand sanitizer in the bathroom! It is hard to plan for every contingency.

If you are using a bus, it helps to have some snacks after the first tour and on the drive to the next tour. Snacks could include water, something sweet, and something salty. Providing cold drinks at the garden tours is also a good idea. Other food items are not necessary at each garden location but can be provided as well. The biggest thing needed is ice-cold drinks! The bus snacks are generally non-perishable and not chilled.

#### Auction



This is the Region's money maker to help pay for the Regional newsletter published three a year. It averages \$2000 per issue to print! I have been to two spring Meetings and one fall Meeting. I learned at this meet-

ing that the auction items, lists, and the running of the auction are mainly handled by Tim Closs and Malcolm Avaritt. This is HUGE! Plants need to be purchased, cared for, and transported to the event. An auction list with plant names and descriptions must also be created. Don't forget to collect pictures of each of the flowers! People are more prone to bid on a plant if they know what it is supposed to look like. Then there is also getting the said list printed in time to be put in each registration bag. It was proposed that we figure out a way to alleviate this responsibility from Malcolm and Tim. Are they our only auctioneers? They do a great job!

Whether in an auction house or a small group like us,

auction rules must apply. We can't arbitrarily decide after we have bid and won an auction item that we aren't going to pay for it. We bid per item, even if there are multiples of said item. Please be respectful of everyone's time and energy. Keep in mind that this is for the Regional Newsletter!



Keep in mind that you need the auctioneers, at least two people to tally the bid numbers and amounts for each item, and support people to handle the plants and give them to the highest bidders. I understand Loris Garrett and Sandy Roberts have been that support for Tim and Malcolm for many years.

#### Registration

Once the dates and places have all been set, you have a



better idea of the expenses you will have in hosting the meeting. That means you can now determine how much registration will be. You can

also determine what your break-even participation number needs to be. Registration can start a good year in advance but must be at least six months. The person you choose for registration CANNOT be your treasurer! Any time money is handled there needs to be at least two people involved. We trust each other, I hope. However, we do not want to put anyone's integrity in question by not having some checks and balances in place. Registration fees can also be raised to a higher rate a month before the event. This is primarily because things are already being purchased and assembled for the event. It is up to the host group if a refund is given in full, partial, or not when notified before the event begins. Again, it is primarily determined by what things are already purchased and printed.

Registration also consists of assembling the registration bags. Each registration bag should include a program, auction list, bidder number, name tag on a lanyard, pen, and notepad. Anything over and beyond that is up to the host group. This can include chapstick, sunscreen, promotional information on local events, etc. Bus Plants – why are they called bus plants? – are also given as participants check-in upon arrival. Purchasing tote bags, name tags, pens, and notepads generally doesn't take a lot of time and can easily be purchased on Amazon in large quantities. Again, how many participants are you expecting? Maybe large quantities are not actually needed.

#### Raffle / Silent Auction

Raffle and Silent Auction items are sold for the benefit of the host group. This is where you can make some money that can also alleviate expenses should the participation numbers not hit your break-even number. Not that that's the only purpose for having a



raffle / silent auction. Items can be purchased, or host



group members can donate them. Whatever works best for your group. Raffle canisters that have been used are empty large M&M containers, as pictured. We collected them from last year's meeting. We have them still, and next year's group is welcome to come get them from us!

The pictures are gold! Make sure you have pictures of any plants you have so that people can see what they are. Seldom are things in bloom on the day of the auction! Luckily, we had several in bloom this year, although we also had pictures attached.

I also thought it was interesting that the Silent Auction

sheets we created had a place for the bidder's name and phone number. We have contact information for everyone on the registration lists, so



there is no need for a contact number. However, if your registration list is not easily accessible during the event, a phone number is helpful in the event the highest bidder leaves the event early and you need to contact them. I also found it interesting that some people wrote their names on the sheets while others just wrote their bidder numbers. In some cases, it made others want to bid against the individual bidding. In other cases, it made them stop the bidding. Neither method is bad or good.

Ensure that your items for bid or silent auction are always monitored. If you do not have someone monitoring them, make sure there is a way to close it off so nothing gets destroyed or stolen. Keep in mind that we are at public locations, and others can walk in at any time. Again, money matters! Make sure there are two there to handle the money.

#### **Club Baskets**

It is up to the host group whether to request each club submit a club basket to be raffled off. This can also be a silent auction item if you prefer. Just remember that income from club baskets should go to the Region. It is best to set a minimum and/or maximum value for each basket.



#### Food /Meals

Generally, we have an evening meal on Friday and then all three meals on Saturday. Remember that you do not have to eat every meal at the hotel! Breakfast is easy

because most hotels provide a continental breakfast already. Lunch is generally off-site at a garden or other location. Dinner can be served at the hotel or in a garden. It all depends on how far away your gardens are and where you are at mealtimes. We are a social group so make sure you



have places where participants can also sit and visit.

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It works great to assign someone in the host group to pick up the meals preordered from local restaurants. Just keep in mind that Italian dishes are generally larger than other meals. It is also good to decide beforehand what you will do with extra food after meals.

Most places you order food from have a specific serving size, so just give them a head count on how many people are being fed. In other places, using this formula I've used for years is a good idea! The main dish is ¼ pound per person. Salads are about half to three-fourths the head count. Then you add up how many sides you have and divide it among the headcount to determine how much of each side to get. Say you have 100 people. That would be 25 to 30 pounds of the main course. The salad would be 50 to 60 servings. Then, say you have green beans, corn, bread, and mashed potatoes. Each side would be 25 servings each. You can adjust the sides to reflect which ones you think most people will eat more of. Always round up

any fractions in your calculations.

You can work with the Region 6 Exhibition Judges Liaison (Patricia Kyser) and the Garden Judges Liaison (Amy Howard) to determine if instructors can be found to teach the appropriate classes. They will need a place to teach and may need other supplies like daylilies to judge!

Make sure you note if any classes are available on your registration information. You can also ask on the registration form if anyone wants or needs a class. Then, based on who signed up for one, determine if you will offer it.

#### **Schedule**

The schedule is a major part! It will keep everyone in



line regarding where and when everything is taking place. If you are having tours, make sure someone drives the route so that you have accurate travel times.

Contact the previous host club if you don't know what to include

in the program. I am sure they will be willing to send you a template of what they used. There is no need to reinvent the wheel. We are a social club and can help each other out!







